Morningside State School caters for students in the primary years of schooling. Prep is non-compulsory and children need to be aged five by 30 June in the year they enrol in Prep.

- An enrolment package must be completed and returned to school. This can be located under the enrolment tab of the school website. Hard copies are also available at the administration office.
- Documentary proof of birth is required to formalise enrolment.
- 2 forms of proof of current residential address is required. Current proof of residency can be provided by way of one of each of the following:
 - One primary source a current rental/lease agreement, or rates notice, or unconditional contract of sale.
 - One secondary source a utility bill (e.g. electricity, gas) showing this same address and parent's/legal guardian's name.
- We appreciate finalising enrolments for our Prep classes by October of the previous year.
- Accurate numbers enable reliable planning and less disruption to classes in the New Year.

Class Numbers

In Prep to Year 3, we aim to have classes with no more than 25 students, and in Year 4-6, no more than 28 students. There may be some multi-age classes in order to ensure class numbers are not too large for effective teaching and learning to take place. We value strong partnerships between students, parents/carers and teachers. We seek to provide the very best education for your child.

End of school day

Procedures for Before School

3:00 pm

As supervision is not provided, we request that students do not arrive at school before 8:35am, unless enrolled in Outside School Hours Care or a supervised extra-curricular activity. Any students arriving at school before 8:35am are to go directly to the green space with their bags and sit on the stage. Our preference is for students to be enrolled in before school care rather than arrive early and be unattended.

All other waiting areas including the climbing equipment, the verandahs and the oval are out of bounds regardless of whether parents are with their children. This excludes Outside School Care, as they have supervisors for children who attend their service.

From 8:35am students may take their bags to their classroom and once teachers have opened their doors, enter their class quietly and begin preparation for the day. Prep children should be supervised by an adult before school at all times and then dropped at their classroom by the adult.

Procedures for After School

Children should go directly home unless enrolled in Outside School Hours Care or a supervised extra-curricular activity. Prep children should be collected from their classroom by an adult.

All other waiting areas including the climbing equipment, the verandahs and the oval are out of bounds regardless of whether parents are with their children. This excludes Outside School Care, as they have supervisors for children who attend their service.

Attendance

We encourage all students and families to work hard to ensure school is the priority, every day. It is vitally important that students attend school every day. It is also important that students arrive at school on time and ready to learn. Early collection from school also disrupts learning and we encourage families to avoid this as much as possible.

A low level of school attendance is associated with:

- Poor academic achievements;
- Early school leaving;
- Leaving school with fewer qualifications;
- · Subsequent unemployment; and
- A lower level of health / life expectancy.

If your child is going to be absent from school, please enter the absence in QParents or phone our student absence line on **3908 2360** before 8:45am. Your phone message should include the student's name, class and the reason they are absent.

If your child arrives late at school, after 9.00am they must come to the office for a late note. If they don't come to the office for a late note, this will result in a text message being sent to the parents enquiring about their absence.

Student Resource Scheme

Each year Morningside State School offers parents the option to join the Student Resource Scheme (SRS). The Student Resource Scheme is supported and approved by the Morningside State School Parents' and Citizens' Association. The purpose of the scheme is to ensure adequate resources are available to provide good quality education to all students, and to save parents' and carers' money and time by allowing them to take advantage of the school bulk purchasing power for teaching and learning resources. The scheme also covers site licensing associated with programs used by the school. Information about cost, due date for payment etc. is issued in Term 4 each year.









Communication

At Morningside State School, we communicate with parents and the community in a number of ways.

• <u>Electronic Newsletter</u>: The e-newsletter is published fortnightly. Parents/carers will need to sign our Email Communication Release Consent form to be able to receive the newsletter. Newsletters are also uploaded each fortnight to our school website.



• **SZapp:** This is used for brief information, updates and reminders. Parents can download this free app from

the App store or Google Play. This communication is invaluable for both quick notification of information as well as handy reminders being posted.

- Parent Representative: Each class has a Parent Rep
 who ensures that the class is kept informed of
 pertinent activities. This will require you to consent to
 your email details being accessed by the Parent Rep as
 well as being shared with class parents.
- Class Newsletters: These are emailed fortnightly by class teachers to keep parents informed of curriculum issues within the classroom.
- Electronic Sign: Our electronic sign provides reminders for important events and celebrates student achievements.

Reporting

Formal reporting to parents occurs through Parent-Teacher interviews twice a year, and through written reports in Terms 2 and 4.

Parent-Teacher interviews are scheduled through the internet-based booking system called SOBS. The link to this booking system will be available on our website. It is only active during specific time periods.

Written reports are emailed to parents so it is important that the office is informed if your contact details change. If you do not have access to email, please ensure you let the office know so we can arrange a hard copy for you.

Please contact your child's class teacher via email if you would like information about your child outside of these times.

URStrong

As a Positive Behaviour for Learning school we have used school data from PBL tracking tools and School Opinion Survey data to select a student program that will compliment the RISE program already embedded in our school. School staff have been URSTRONG trained and we continue to focus on student social-emotional learning, implementing tools and strategies to support our efforts in creating a safe and caring school.

URSTRONG further empowers our students with skills, and creates and further develops our school community where children are better able to manage their relationships in a safe and respectful environment. Emotional literacy, 'quick comebacks', friendship fires, healthy friendships and identifying non-healthy friendships are all key topics in the URStrong program.

Student Code of Conduct

Our Student Code of Conduct was collaboratively developed between staff, students and parents. It is regularly reviewed. A copy can be found on our website.

School Curriculum

Morningside State School implements the Australian Curriculum in all learning areas. Our Prep curriculum aligns with the Australian Curriculum Foundation level. School curriculum programs incorporate elements of Education Queensland's C2C (Curriculum into the Classroom) units of work.

Teachers work collaboratively to adapt these units and ensure that they suit the context of the community, the school, the classrooms and most importantly, the students. Units are planned and delivered with careful consideration of the knowledge and skills to be taught (content), the activities or ways students learn the content (process), the documented evidence of student learning (product) and the physical and emotional setting of the classroom (environment). This means that in every year level the same curriculum is delivered, however, the way the curriculum is taught in each classroom may look different, in response to the learning styles and needs of the students in a particular class. Class teachers and Inclusion teachers work together to identify and implement relevant strategies, resources and differentiation practices to support the learning and success for ALL of our students.

Throughout units of work, students receive specific and constructive feedback on ways to improve their learning. Students in many classes are actively involved in setting their own learning goals, based on the feedback given to them by their teachers.

Culture of Thinking

"When you see the thinking, you know the learning."
Ron Ritchhart

A Culture of Thinking is a learning environment where thinking is valued, visible and actively promoted. Ron Ritchhart, a researcher at Harvard University, has identified 8 cultural forces in every classroom that help to promote thinking. These are **expectations**, **language**, **time**, **modelling**, **opportunities**, **routines**, **interactions** and the **environment**.



At Morningside we develop teaching and learning sequences incorporating a Culture of Thinking. We value a Culture of Thinking (CoT) as places where a group's collective as well as individual thinking forms part of the regular, day-to-day experience of all group members.

Our teachers strive to create a culture of thinking in their classrooms using a variety of methods, including "thinking routines" which support a common language of thinking, time and organisation for thinking, an environment rich with the documents of thinking processes, and making teacher and student thinking, and subsequently learning, visible.

Excursions and Camps

At appropriate times, teachers will organise educational excursions and incursions. Camps are held in Years 4, 5 and 6. A letter will be sent home informing you of any changes to routine and the costs involved.

Languages Other Than English (LOTE) – Japanese Studies

Prep – Year 6 study Japanese. While Japanese language is the main focus of this subject, cultural matters are also embedded into the program.

Classroom Music and Drama

Our Music and Drama program is based on the Australian Curriculum guidelines. All students receive a 30 minute lesson each week in either music or drama from a specialist teacher.

Assessment is conducted through observation, anecdotal records, checklists and written tests as students move into the higher year levels. Achievement is included in each student's written semester reports.

To supplement the classroom music program, students have opportunities to join a choir or play in a ukulele band and perform at assemblies and at special events.

Instrumental Music Program

Morningside State School offers instrumental music instruction to interested and capable students in Years 4 to 6 for woodwind, brass and percussion instruments. Invitations to enter the program are determined through a music aptitude test at the end of Year 3. Half hour lessons are conducted weekly as well as band practice before school.

Health and Physical Education

A Health and Physical Education (HPE) teacher takes a lesson with each class every week. In Terms 1 and 4, all students in Years 1 – 6 participate in weekly swimming lessons. Prep participate in swimming lessons in Term 4. The swimming program is an important part of the Health and Physical Education curriculum, and all students are obliged to attend. To ensure a high quality swim program is implemented, the school employs a qualified swim coach to assist with lessons. Your child must have the following to swim in the school pool:

- A swimsuit (one piece only for girls) and sun shirt
- A swimming cap for health and safety reasons this is compulsory
- A towel

A Swimming Permission Note is required annually. Please ensure all belongings are clearly named and in a waterproof bag.

If your child is unable to swim on any day a note must be sent to the classroom teacher. If your child suffers from a medical condition (for example, epilepsy, heart condition, etc.), which could manifest itself in the pool, a doctor's certificate stating your child's inability to take part in lessons is essential. A parent volunteer to assist with each

class is required. Younger siblings are not able to attend. In Terms 2 and 3 the HPE teacher provides a weekly lesson for all students covering a range of areas to suit age and ability for each year level.

Special Sports' Days

Each year students take part in our Prep -2 Fun Run, Years 3-6 Cross Country and Sports Carnivals. Parents are invited and children take part in a range of athletics events. Each year in Term 4, students participate in a Swimming Carnival. Once again, parents are welcome to cheer and encourage the students.



Representative Sport

Morningside State School is affiliated with the Lytton District for primary schools. This means students who are aged 10-13 years are eligible for all representative sports whether or not the sport is played at the school. While the school automatically sends teams to swimming and athletics trials, students may also be nominated for other sports if they meet the criteria set by the Lytton District. All questions regarding representative sport can be made to our HPE teacher.

Interschool Sport

Each year, students in Years 4 - 6 may participate in interschool Gala Days. These days are organised by the Lytton District. The sporting options available are dependent on numbers of students and the availability of facilities and coaches. These excursions are endorsed by the P&C Association.

Resource Centre



Our Resource Centre is a vibrant place for all students at lunch time.

A regular borrowing program ensures all children have access to our extensive collection for both schoolwork and home reading.

The library is automated and all resources can be identified and located through the use of our computer network. Students are able

to use computers to identify books or other resources that meet their research or reading needs. Students can also access the Resource Centre Computer Lab.

Children will be able to borrow books from the school library. In an effort to keep the books in good repair we provide Prep students with a library bag through the SRS program. Students are asked to take this bag to the library when they borrow books and continue to use this bag throughout their primary school years. The Resource Centre is open during the lunch breaks for students.

Information and Communication Technologies (ICT)

Morningside State School is committed to using ICT to enhance student learning. Students use a range of ICT as tools to engage with their peers and demonstrate their understanding of key concepts.

All classrooms are fitted with interactive whiteboards, desktops, laptops and Ipads. This is complemented by full connectivity in the Resource Centre, where students are also able to access computers.

As part of the Student Resource Scheme, students have access to Reading Eggs and/or Reading Eggspress and Mathletics, depending on their learning needs.

Parental permission and student undertakings are signed to ensure that Internet and email provide valuable learning experiences and are used appropriately.

A Digital Technologies teacher helps to support teachers and students in their learning.

Inclusion Program

At Morningside, we are committed to 'Every Student Succeeding' and that, every student has the ability to learn. We recognise and acknowledge that "all students can access and fully participate in learning, alongside their similar-aged peers, supported by reasonable adjustments and teaching and learning strategies tailored to meet their individual needs." - Qld Department of Education, Inclusive Education Policy 2020.

Students enrolled at Morningside work alongside their peers with the support of their Class Teachers, Inclusion Teachers and Teacher Aides. Reasonable adjustments are implemented to ensure successful student participation and outcomes in all learning opportunities. This results in students and their families being a valued member of the whole community.

To ensure every student succeeds to their potential, at times teachers will refer students to our Recognition & Response(R&R) Committee. This committee meets weekly and consists of our Guidance Officer, Head Inclusion Teacher, Speech Language Pathologist, Inclusion Teachers, Head of Department (Curriculum), Deputy Principal and Principal. This referral process involves the committee discussing current student supports and recommending additional adjustments the classroom teachers can implement.

Guidance Officer

Students who experience problems during school, including social, emotional or learning related, may be referred to the Guidance Officer. Parents are always consulted before this and actions may include interviews, formal assessments, counselling, referral to other agencies, and AVTs.

The Guidance Officer is a key person in decision making with regard to special support and/or placements for children with low-incidence disabilities and always works in collaboration with parents, teachers and other specially trained personnel.

The Guidance Officer works at our school three days per week. One day per week is funded through the Student Well-being Program.

Chaplaincy Program

Morningside State School Chaplaincy Program provides additional support for the social/emotional needs of students. Support is provided through games, Brekky Club, school excursions, in classrooms, and a variety of other ways. Our School Chaplain works in the school two days a week. No religious instruction is undertaken while working with students without prior written parental consent.

Advisory Visiting Teachers

Advisory Visiting Teachers (AVTs) have received additional training to support students. They work across a number of schools within the region and visit on a needs basis. Referral to AVTs is made by the school with parent consent. AVTs work in a variety of ways within the school, from an advisory role, providing support and resources, planning individual educational plans, working within the classroom, to individual or small group teaching. Methods of service delivery and support given are relative to the particular needs of the student.

Speech Language Therapy Services

Good listening, speaking and communication help students in all aspects of classroom learning, especially reading, writing and spelling. A Speech Language Pathologist (SLP) visits the school regularly to assist students who experience difficulties in speech, oral language and communication.

Students can be referred to the SLP by parents/carers and teachers. The needs of each child are considered through the R & R Process. The SLP liaises with parents, teachers and other specialist support personnel to provide programs for school as well as the student at home.

English as an Additional Language or Dialect EAL/D

At Morningside State School, we cater to the diverse needs of our EAL/D learners.

EAL/D learners include students:

- born overseas or in Australia
- beginning school with little, some or no exposure to English
- who speak a language/s other than English at home

EAL/D learners will have support and resources available to help them achieve their personal and academic goals, especially in the areas of reading, writing and spelling.

Student Leader Program

Our school is proud of the Morningside Student Leader Program. During Terms 3 and 4 all students in Year 5 undergo a series of leadership discussions in their classroom and are given the opportunity to attend a Leadership Camp. From these leadership discussions and opportunities students are asked to self-nominate for various leadership positions within our school. These include:

School Captain x 4

And/or an opportunity to apply for:

- Environmental Captain/Ecomarine Ambassador x 4
- Sports Captain x 4 per house
- Arts Captain x 4
- Digital Media Captain x 4
- Peer Support Leaders



Each student in Year 5 will receive a Student Leadership Expression of Interest and Leadership Passport. Morningside State School staff endorse Leadership Passports.

The Principal and Deputy Principal meet with the Student Council every week during Year 6. Student Leaders have many opportunities to engage in leadership tasks, community events and opportunities throughout their final year.

Students in Prep – Year 6 also have the opportunity to be Class Captains and all students are encouraged to participate in student activities to contribute student voice in our school.

Home Learning club

Home learning Club is a program that is offered with 2-3 teachers and teacher aides before and after school. Students work in small groups to complete their in class homework tasks. The program is for Year 1 – Year 6 and is held in the Resource Centre.

Students must be dropped off/picked up by a parent or guardian at the end. Students from OSHC can attend however, parents need to see the OSHC coordinator for an extra curriculum permission note.

Home learning club is for students who require assistance with their understanding or language skills. It is for students whose families are unable to assist them at home and would benefit from the assistance of teachers. If there is a high demand in any year, class teachers will be consulted as part of the selection process. A permission note will be forwarded to parents, if there are spaces available.

J Club

Our Japanese teacher runs Hiragana 'Karate' Club designed for students in Years 3 - 6 who are interested in mastering the Japanese phonetic alphabet, aka Hiragana. Self-paced in learning, students are offered a variety of fun activities to help them learn and remember the 46 basic characters and then commence on the blends. Students work through the belts to achieve 'Black Belt' status. This activity will appear on Report Cards as an extracurricular activity. Commitment is required.

A more generic 'J' club is offered for the lower grades (Years 1 - 6) in the Japanese Classroom. Themes change through the terms and may include Japanese children's story telling, script writing, art, number games, origami and Japanese toy play.

Coding Club

Coding Club runs one day a week each term with our Digital Technologies Mentor after school. Coding Club is open to all students in Years 4 - 6. Students will require an account with Scratch to save and load their work easily.

Music Lunchtime Groups

Morningside State School offers music lunchtime activities. These are coordinated by our Music teacher and held in the Music room. Activities include:

Beginners Ukulele (Prep – Year 6), Advanced Ukulele (Year 2 – year 6) & Choir (Year 2 – Year 6)

All of the lunchtime activities are free. The only requirement is consistent commitment from students to give up their playtime and attend the rehearsals. Support from parents/carers to encourage at home practice, respond to emails and attend performances is also greatly appreciated. All groups have rolls to track attendance and keep track of students who are valuing their place in the group.

Environmental Club

MSS Environmental Club is a school-run group supported by several teachers. New members are always welcome at Environmental Club.



The aim of the club is to support the work already happening in our school community, including:

- Gardening
- Waste Reduction, Reuse & Recycling
- Environmental Education & Awareness
- Water and Energy Conservation
- Sustainable Procurement

The club meets one day each week during lunch times in the Outdoor Classroom area (behind F block). The club also has regular weekend working bee sessions.

Health Policy

Children with infectious diseases must, and will, be excluded from school for specified times. Consult your doctor, teacher or Qld Health if you need clarification. In cases of minor ailments, parents are asked to use their own judgment about whether the child is fit enough to attend school. Please consider other children's health. Children who become ill during the day will be removed from the group to rest and parents/carers will be notified.

If your child is going to be absent from school, please enter the absence in QParents app or phone our student absence line on **3908 2360** before 8:45am. Your phone message should include the student's name, class and the reason they are absent.

Medication

If children need to take medication prescribed by a medical practitioner during school time, parents are asked to follow these policy guidelines:

- 1. Parent or guardian must complete an authority form for medication to be administered. These forms are available at the school office.
- 2. The student's medication in original packaging with the pharmacist label prescribed by a Doctor with written instructions on the container must be given to an Administration staff member.
- 3. All doses given will be recorded by the person responsible for giving medication.
- 4. Over the counter medications e.g. 'Panadol', cough mixture etc. needs to be prescribed by a doctor and labelled by a pharmacy with the student's names and dosage amount. At no time must any medication be kept in student bags.

All medication must be administered from the main office in Administration (A Block) where it is stored securely along with the paperwork provided by the parents regarding this. The only exception to this is Asthma medications, EpiPens and medication associated with diabetes. Please provide the school with a copy of your child's Health Plan and ensure it is regularly updated by your child's health professional.

Religious Instruction

Under the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006, approved local religious leaders provide Religious Instruction lessons for year 1 students, with parent permission, every fortnight for 30 minutes. More information can be found on our school website.

Voluntary Assistance

We greatly appreciate the help and support of our volunteers. We realise parents are extremely busy and many have younger children or work full time. However, if you are able to help in any way, please tell us. Your participation in everyday school activities will help your children bridge the gap between home and school and help to build for themselves a secure and happy environment. Please remember to sign in at the office. New Department of Education guidelines now make it **mandatory** for all volunteers, other than parents, to have a Blue Card **before** beginning any voluntary work in our school. All volunteers will need to complete Annual Mandatory Training when signing in.

P&C Association

Background
